Jennifer Gilbert grew up in rural Pennsylvania. As a young girl, she watched Baltimore television stations-- not knowing that one day she would have the privilege of living her dream as a television news anchor--in Baltimore.

After almost 30 years in the television news industry, Jennifer retired in 2019 from her role as weeknight anchor at WBFF-TV FOX45.

Jennifer is a graduate of Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism. She began her broadcast career at WGAL-TV in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, before coming to Baltimore in 1993.

Throughout her career, Jennifer covered some of the biggest news stories in Baltimore, including the visit of Pope John Paul II, the manhunt for Joseph Palczynski, the criminal trial of Ray Lewis in Atlanta, the terrorist attacks of 9/11, and the unrest following the death of Freddie Gray. Jennifer traveled nationally and internationally to cover disasters including Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans, and the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. She was thrilled to return to New Orleans in better times, to cover the Super Bowl victory of the Baltimore Ravens in 2013.

Jennifer is a member of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Silver Circle, which honors individuals who have made significant contributions to the broadcast industry for 25 years or more. She won seven Capital Region Emmy Awards, and numerous awards from the Associated Press and Society of Professional Journalists. In 2002, Jennifer was named "Best News Anchor" by Baltimore Magazine.

Jennifer has a deep commitment to several community and charitable organizations. She also served as an affiliate instructor at Loyola University Maryland and continues to be a mentor to countless students and young professionals.

In her retirement, Jennifer is treasuring every moment spent with family, including her son, Michael, and husband, Ed.
